Each year, <u>EBAA awards</u> individuals and organizations that dedicate their time and expertise to restore sight to the blind and visually impaired. This year's awardees are truly deserving of the honors EBAA will bestow on them.

- The Leonard Heise Award is presented annually to an outstanding eye bank in recognition of his/her commitment to the profession.
- The Gift of Sight Award is presented to a professional who whose efforts have demonstrated significant support of eye banking and corneal donation.
- The Crystal Cornea Award is given to an individual or organization not directly affiliated with eye banking but which advances the profession's interests and EBAA mission.

Lions Clubs were charged by Helen Keller in 1927 to be "the Knights of the Blind"; since then, the Lions have dedicated themselves to providing services the prevention and treatment of vision loss. The majority of eye banks in the U.S. were founded by Lions Clubs, and more than half of
